Our Town's Naval Namesake

Named for Thomaston, Maine, the home of General Knox

Did you know a U.S. Navy ship was once named after our town? The USS Thomaston (LSD-28) holds a unique place in history. You can find two framed pictures of her right here in town—one at the Town Office and another at the Thomaston Historical Society. If you haven't seen them, stop by and take a look.

Commissioned in September 1954 in Pascagoula, Mississippi, the Thomaston was the lead ship of her class of dock landing ships. Initially assigned to Arctic and Aleutian operations, she later took part in several major events.

During the Cuban Missile Crisis, she supported naval operations in the region. With the Vietnam War, she was deployed to the South China Sea and participated in the initial U.S. Marine landings at Da Nang and Chu Lai in March 1965. In the years that followed, she moved Marines and supplies upriver and handled coastal logistics between Da Nang, Cam Ranh Bay, and Thon My Thuy—grimly nicknamed "Murder Beach." There, she also served as a repair dock. Toward the end of the war, she helped with troop and cargo transport and amphibious operations. She played a vital role in evacuating Americans and refugees before returning to Pacific Fleet service.

After 30 years of service, the Thomaston was decommissioned in September 1984 and officially removed from the Naval Vessel Register in 1992.



Interestingly, Thomaston resident and retired maritime captain Mike Flanagan once walked her decks—a special tie between our town and this historic vessel.

Thomaston Doctors and Pharmacists

In 2021 the Historical Society received an interesting donation related to a Dr. Everett Hodgkins, who lived and worked on Main Street Thomaston. This prompted volunteers to assemble an exhibit of medical providers in early Thomaston. This showcase dedicated to early medicine is nearing completion and we hope it will pique the curiosity of our members and visitors.

Dr. Hodgkins arrived in Thomaston in the 1930s to practice medicine. He practiced here until his death in 1944. When his wife went to live with her niece, many things from his medical office went with her; these were stored for decades in Carol & Richard Joyal's barn until donating medical books, documents and instruments to us. These tools give us a rare glimpse into the medical care Dr. Hodgkins provided the citizens of Thomaston. It is clear he practiced cutting edge gynecology.



While some of the medical equipment is similar to what is currently used, other pieces feel quite barbaric.

Hodgkins was a practitioner of short current electrical therapies. These were used to treat a myriad of ailments including sexually transmitted infections. The warmth generated from these probes placed in the most unfortunate locations may have been soothing but, most certainly did not cure infection and could inflicted burns and start operating room fires.

This deep dive into Dr. Hodgkins triggered a larger project to explore other former Thomaston doctors and pharmacies. The archives of the museum contained images of Dr Stacey's horse and buggy from which he peddled "Little Giant Pills" at the turn of the century. We have unearthed from the archives a vial of those pills and numerous bottles from three Thomaston pharmacies that concocted and distributed cures throughout the 19th century.

Come by the museum to see these questionable and sometimes toxic tonics and learn more about the doctors and pharmacies in early Thomaston. Also visit an upcoming exhibit at the Thomaston Library featuring the beloved pets of historical Thomaston residents and related old veterinary drugs.

Slate of Programs Scheduled for 2025


